COVID update November 2021

Over the first few months of the COVID pandemic, we were accustomed to daily updates from the First Minster, with regard to the current level of restrictions in place in Scotland, and what that meant to us in a church setting. As these updates seem to be few and far between these days, you might feel COVID is a thing of the past, or, that in the midst of things our needs as a church have been forgotten. Rest assured that is not the case; representatives from Church of Scotland and the other main faith groups in Scotland meet regularly with the Scot Government to discuss where we are with regard to the current restrictions. As we know from experience there is often a feeling in some sectors that they have been forgotten and that the rules seen to be inconsistent, and to be honest sometimes they are. That has led to accusations (and if I am honest, suspect that it will be until we are fully free from restrictions) that some sectors are being discriminated against, for example the nightclub sector which was closed for far longer than churches.

So where are we now? We need to recognise that each and every one of us will have our own attitude toward risk. As Kirk Sessions we have tried to balance that with the restrictions we have. In a worship setting social distancing has been discontinued, however, we recognise that some people will want to sit with their friends, whilst others would feel safer sitting 1m or 2m apart from one another - that's absolutely fine to do that there is space for all of us. To be honest churches practised social distancing long before it was a requirement! If you go to your local supermarket you will see that one way systems are no longer in place, however, we do still have one way systems in place in church. Masks or visors still require to be worn, unless a person is medically exempt from wearing one. Singing or saying the Lord's Prayer together is permitted as long as face coverings are in place. Hand sanitising on entry and exit are also necessary. The burden of additional cleaning means that some areas of our buildings are still not being used every week

All in all things are looking much closer to what they did prior to the pandemic, and hopefully will continue to get even closer to normality in the weeks and months to come. However we need to remember that COVID has not gone, thankfully due to vaccinations and mitigations the number of people dying from it is far less than it was at the height of the pandemic, but infection rates remain stubbornly high.

We want you to be safe, whilst at the same time having a worship experience as near as possible to the type you enjoyed before the pandemic. Hopefully the current restrictions in place allow for that to happen as much as we can just now.

Computer Club

This still meets at 10.30 on Monday mornings. The members at present remain in their homes and use a video internet "chat line". At present we have not reinstalled the broadband connection in the hall which we disconnected during the COVID lockdown. The room we used is too small for distancing so w will probably require to use a hall.

As our funds would require to cover this and the cost of use of the hall we applied for a grant. The result of this will not be known until December so we await this before we set a date for restarting. Ian Glen

Wishaw CAP Debt Centre

I hope you are all keeping safe and well. Due to the relaxation of Covid -19 restrictions, home visits to clients have resumed (with appropriate safety measures in place). The system of phone/video call consultations is still in place at all stages for those clients who prefer it. At present we are supporting 18 clients and their families. Two people have had their cases closed as they were not engaging with us and/or providing required paperwork, but most people are participating well with the process. 2 new clients have booked in during the past week. The callback diary with Motherwell Jobcentre continues each Monday morning This began at the start of March. This allows me to contact people who have been identified by the work coaches as possibly requiring our service.

The great news is that 3 people have gone debt free in the last month, with another having found their own route out of debt!! In addition, one client (a couple) have moved over to the Debt Arrangement Scheme (DAS) and so their CAP Plan has been closed. It is very satisfying to see people complete the process and resolve their money issues. Each will have a 'debt free budget' which will help them stick to good budgeting practices going forward. We pray that all these clients will be able to enjoy their freedom from financial worry and stress and can look forward to the future with hope. Every centre depends on the local church and volunteers to operate effectively. We simply can't do it without you! If you would like to volunteer as a befriender and come along on the visits, to provide support to our clients, or join our prayer meetings, please let me know.

Challenge Poverty Week 4-10 October 2021

The Poverty Alliance organised a week-long event, 'Challenge Poverty' and as part of the event we invited local MSPs Clare Adamson (Motherwell & Wishaw) and Neil Gray (Airdrie & Shotts) along to our debt centre to discuss how debt, poverty & poor mental health affect their constituents. Throughout Challenge Poverty Week CAP Scotland were raising awareness about the impact that poverty and problem debt can have on mental health as over a quarter (28%) of CAP clients have attempted or considered suicide as way out of debt. With 45% of people in Scotland not knowing where to turn to get free debt help this is a growing concern. Following his visit to CAP Scotland's Debt Centre in Wishaw, which covers a large section of his constituency, Neil Gray, who is also the Convener for the Social Justice and Social Security Committee, said: "I really appreciated the opportunity to visit the local Christians Against Poverty team and hear more about their fantastic work. They have supported so many of my constituents with debt issues and the support they have provided has saved so many people from incredibly challenging situations. Debt, poverty and mental health problems are all interlinked and can lead to a vicious cycle where all three get worse. By sharing their issues with organisations like Christians Against Poverty people can get the help they need to escape that spiral of debt, poverty and mental health problems."



SNP MSP, Clare Adamson, added: "So many people have been up against it these last 18 months. There has been a greater focus on mental health with people experiencing isolation, uncertainty and anxiety over the immensely challenging times we have faced. Debt and mental health are unquestionably linked. Building debt leads to mounting anxiety and people in that position have to face twin stigmas in getting necessary help. There still exists stigma around both accruing debt and mental health issues. "No one should feel trepidation in seeking support and it is our collective obligation to empower

people to seek help when it is needed. It was a privilege visiting the team at Christians Against Poverty. Their dedicated staff and volunteers are working tirelessly to erode that stigma and providing lifeline support for people facing poverty. Please, if you are facing debt, or if you are struggling with your mental health, do not suffer in silence; reach out."

LiveWell Foodbank

Recently we received a very generous donation from Coltness Memorial & Bonkle Churches, following the joint Harvest Thanksgiving service; this is truly appreciated, and thank you to all who donated. We also received donations from Cambusnethan North Parish Church following their Harvest Service on October 24th.

The demand has remained steady and we have been able to help those in need in the local community. We are making deliveries to those who are shielding, ill or otherwise unable to attend when we are open, so that no-one who needs help is left out.

It is open every Wednesday between 1pm and 2.30pm at Coltness Memorial Church in Newmains. Referrals can be obtained via the Scottish Welfare Fund (0300 555 0405 crisis grant option).
